

Your Benefits Q & A

Question: I have become a full time employee and I would like to sign up for medical benefits for myself and my family. What must I do to get coverage and what will be the cost?

Answer: The City provides health benefits for all eligible employees. To sign up for Medical Insurance contact Terryll Holland in Accounting at 288-2548. The cost is \$15.00 per week for an employee. For an employee and spouse the cost is \$35.00 per week, for an employee and child the cost is \$30.00 per week, and for an employee and his family the cost is \$45.00 per week.

Question: My son is currently enrolled in college. In order for him to be covered under my medical insurance he must be a full-time student. Would you explain this?

Answer: A full-time student means a participating dependent child who is enrolled in regularly attending an accredited college, university, vocational, or technical school. For the purpose of this definition "full-time" means a minimum of twelve (12) semester or quarter hours, unless the school's definition of full-time attendance is less. For vocational and technical schools, the definition of full-time student must be provided by the school itself.


WATER TREATMENT

Dyersburg's Wellhead Protection Areas

Groundwater is often taken for granted. Once it is polluted, it may be impossible to clean. Groundwater can become polluted by the improper disposal of household hazardous waste, over use of water, improper application of pesticides and fertilizers, leaking underground storage tanks, faulty septic systems, improper disposal of industrial wastes and over use of road salts.

The City of Dyersburg is very fortunate to have plenty of good safe drinking water. Your support is needed to keep our water safe for future generations. You can help protect our groundwater by properly disposing all hazardous materials, using non-hazardous products whenever possible, and reporting activities that may result in groundwater contamination.

Street Department



March has been a very busy month for the Street Dept. Bad weather brings about many activities including cleaning up fallen trees and branches and cleaning out ditches to help prevent flooding.

An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure as the doctor would say. Keeping your yard maintained by removing leaves, low hanging and rotten limbs, rotted trees and limbs near electrical wires will thwart some of the danger of storm damage to your home. Contact Dyersburg Electric for trees that need trimming because of their proximity to electrical wires. The Street Dept. visited several locations to remove downed trees and limbs due to the high winds on March the 18th. In addition, keeping neighborhood ditches free of debris so that storm water can flow through them keeps our roads accessible during heavy rains. It is against the law to throw trash and debris into ditches. The Street Dept. offers curbside service once each month to pick up items residents wish to dispose of but are too large to put in their garbage cans.

Approximately 150 ft. of 24" culvert was installed on Parr Av. Due to the close proximity of the ditch to the road, the decision was made to dig the ditch and install a new culvert, then construct storm drain boxes to receive and divert storm water. In addition, about 120 ft. of 36" culvert was replaced on Upper Finley Rd. Shoulder work was done on Millsfield Hwy. and Upper Finley Rd. Broken drain box repair, curb and drips, verifying citizen complaints, pot holes, and keeping our community clean and roadways safe are just a few of the responsibilities of the Street Dept.

We strive to make Dyersburg inviting to potential newcomers and new businesses by routinely maintaining our roadways and properties. Property maintenance can be a difficult or sensitive issue and our complaint department makes every effort to handle delicate situations by having a working relationship with property owners. I am proud to say that the Dyersburg Public Works Department goes far and beyond to respond to the requests of our residents within regulations.

FREE ADVICE

Read this and make a copy for your files in case you need to refer to it someday.

1. Do not sign the back of your credit cards. Instead, put PHOTO ID REQUIRED.
2. When you are writing checks to pay on your credit card accounts DO not put the complete account # on the "For" or "Memo" line, instead just put the last four numbers.
3. Put your work phone # on your checks instead of your home #. Never have your SS# printed on your checks.
4. Place the contents of your wallet on a photocopy machine. Do both sides of each license, credit card, etc. You will know what you had in your wallet and all of the account #'s and phone #'s to call and cancel. Keep the photocopy in a safe place so you can call and cancel your cards immediately if they are lost or stolen.
5. File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where your credit cards, etc. were stolen. This proves to credit providers your where diligent and this is a first step toward an investigation if there ever is one.
6. MOST IMPORTANT: Call the 3 national credit reporting organizations and the Social Security Fraud line number to place a fraud alert on your name. This alert means any company that checks your credit knows your information was stolen and they have to contact you by phone to authorize new credit.

Dyer County Solid Waste Report



Call it garbage, solid waste, refuse, trash! It's the waste we produce in our homes and businesses. We throw it into cans and dumpsters, set it on our curbsides, and put it out for pickup. Our trash, plus our neighbors' and everyone else's adds up to a massive pile of waste. In fact, each year our nation generates enough garbage to fill a convoy of trash trucks reaching halfway to the moon. And the convoy keeps growing longer every year!

I met with the Regional Solid Waste Committee members for the Gibson, Dyer and Crockett County Region on March 18th. Together, the County and City work together to reduce solid waste, crack down on illegal dumping and promote reducing, reusing and recycling products to save the environment and extend the life of our landfills.

In Dyer County more than 22,656 tons of municipal solid waste was collected; 89,776.40 tons of municipal solid waste was recycled, reduced or reused, thereby reducing Dyer County's waste stream by 70.17%.

Tires are re-routed from the landfill; shredded and used to build roads, cushion play-grounds, and is burnt for energy. Over 9 tons of old asphalt was reused by Ford Construction on the sides of roads, and dirt is re-used as cover for the landfill. White goods (old appliances) are taken from the landfill to Hutcherson Scrap and recycled. Used motor oil is collected and recycled into re-refined motor oil or fuel blended with other fuels to be burned in industrial boilers for energy.

This year, Gibson County will be hosting our Household Hazardous Waste Event on May 17th. It will be held at the Ed Jones Agri-plex on Manufacturers Row in Trenton, TN.



"Now you see it..."

When Brandon, my oldest son (he'll be 32 in July and will love that I brought this up!) was about 4 or 5 he asked one of those dreaded questions you don't quite know how to answer, "Mom, where does poop go?" Oh, boy... when kids ask questions. I liked to answer as honestly as possible without giving more information than is necessary. I'm sure I did some fast thinking and gave him some kind of answer that satisfied him at the time, but I am sure it was not factual as I have only found out recently where all that stuff we flush down the toilet goes.

As a Public Works employee I have learned a lot about the complexity of the services we provide the City's residents. To get a better understanding of our Wastewater Systems I went right to the source; the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Mike Goff, Assistant Superintendent, was kind enough to give me a guided tour of the plant.

The first thing I learned is that these men work really hard. They have to have a working knowledge of hydraulics, be an electrician, mechanic, machinist, maintenance man, weather man, grounds keeper and more. If you've ever visited the WWTP you probably noticed the grounds are beautifully maintained.

So briefly, here is what I found out:

Process water from local industries and what we flush down the toilet, what drains from our sinks, washing machines, etc. is moved into a complex system of sanitary sewer lines which go to a central pump station located on Klondike Av. This central pump station actually moves all of these the waters and any solids (called influent flow) to the WWTP. From there the water moving through the lines and any solids go through a screening process to remove large debris and then to a "grit" removal system. From there the liquid spends about 2-3 hours in a "clarifier" via a "splitter" which has "weirs" or troughs which allow approximately 98% of the organic materials to settle out. The other 2% enters a biological treatment system called an "aeration" basin where bacteria and microorganisms feed on the 2% which was suspended in the basin and causes any remaining materials to settle. A blower actually pulls air out of the atmosphere then compresses and pumps the air into a "diffuser system". This creates an environment where bacteria and microorganisms can thrive and do their part to break down the suspended solids; these liquids go through biological treatments twice and through settlings three times. The liquids then go to the "chlorine contact chamber" where the chlorine disinfects the water, not to drinking quality, but an environmentally safe water to discharge. Finally the environmentally safe water (99.9% free of any organic matter and pathogens) now goes to a "cascade aerator" where the water splashes down steps which aids in adding dissolved oxygen into the water before it is discharged into the Forked Deer River behind the WWTP. **Now you don't!**

Scheduled tours are given at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. If you have a child interested in this process; talk with their teacher or group leader about scheduling a field trip to the Wastewater Treatment Plant. To schedule a tour, call 286-7626 from 7:00a.m.-3:30p.m., Monday thru Friday.

Thanks Mike, for taking me on a tour and thanks to Mike and my son, Tim Griffith, who also works at the WWTP, (and who is more than happy to correct me when I'm wrong!) for helping me word this article correctly.

Tim, if Chloe or Lincoln asks "where does poop go, dad?" I'm sure you'll have the answer!

Meet Cortney Spencer. Cortney was your typical teenage girl who at 15 wanted to get her drivers permit so she could life guard at the community pool the following summer. During the process of picture-taking, she was asked if she wanted to be an organ donor. She thought for just 5 seconds, a long time for a 15 year old, but she knew her Mom and Dad had signed their own donor cards, and said "Yes, I'll be an organ donor. If anything happens to me I won't need them anyway and they may help someone else." Three months later, January 2002, just 2 days past her 16th birthday, Cortney experienced a brain aneurism. Two days later she was pronounced brain dead. Her parents did not have to make the decision to donate. Cortney had made it for herself. Courtney saved 3 lives because she made the decision to sign her donor card.

How to be an Organ & Tissue Donor

Register online with your state donor registry; you can even choose which organs and/or tissue you would like to donate. Just go to www.tndonorregistry.org.

Designate your decision on your driver's license. Do this each time you obtain or renew your license so you won't be removed from the registry.

Sign a donor card now. Carry the donor card with you until you can designate your donation decision on your driver's license or join a donor registry.

Talk to your family now about your donation decision. Help your family understand your wish to be an organ and tissue donor before a crisis occurs. Then they will be prepared to serve as your advocate for donation.
