**3-1-1** signs that is. The 3-1-1 advertising committee is utilizing tv, radio, newspaper, vehicle decals, refrigerator magnets, street signs and other means to inform the citizens of Dyersburg about our 3-1-1 Citizen Contact Center. Street signs are positioned at various locations around town including some of the main entrances to Dyersburg, high traffic areas and the City Hall lobby. Many maintenance and service vehicles have 3-1-1 decals on the back end or tail gate.

If you have a request for city service or information you may dial 3-1-1 seven days a week, 24 hours a day and a 3-1-1 operator will assist you. If you prefer, you may go online at [www.dyersburgtn.gov](http://www.dyersburgtn.gov) and follow the 3-1-1 link to fill out a request for service or obtain information.

Note: VOIP phone service and some cell phone users must dial 285-4019.

As many of you know, we kicked off the City of Dyersburg 311 non-emergency Citizen Contact Center on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2010. 311 will provide the public one simple telephone number to call to initiate requests for all city government services and information. As of this writing, we have received 2,831 calls on this number. This new service has been well received and has proved to be a great benefit for the citizens of our community. In this newsletter you will find a letter that I received from Frank Salowitz regarding a recent call he made to 311. I have also received many calls and comments from others in the community expressing their appreciation for the 311 service. Thanks once again to each of the city departments and employees for their outstanding efforts in making this successful. I would like to remind everyone that the 311 service is also available on the City of Dyersburg website at [www.dyersburgtn.gov](http://www.dyersburgtn.gov). There are many knowledge based articles about city operations available to the public, with more to come in the future.

I have also received letters from others expressing their appreciation to various city personnel for their assistance. Judy Rose from Newbern was involved in a serious wreck recently and was very impressed with the level of care and concern she received from members of the Dyersburg Fire Department that were on the scene. 



**Dyersburg Fire Department**

Three of Dyersburg's Bravest attend classes at Millington Naval Support Center.

Paul Braithwaite, Richard Fowlkes, and Scotty Hollis have been assigned to complete and certify as Confined Space Rescue Technicians. This class will require each man to complete two weeks (eighty hours) training presented by the Maryland Fire and Rescue Institute at the Naval Support Center in Millington, TN.

In the summer 2009 the fire department began standing by for rescue purposes in all confined space entries within city departments. This certification will allow these men to bring the entire fire department a vast of useful knowledge for training purposes. The fire department also works with industries within the city, providing rescues along with industry trained personnel.

Program content is designed to meet the requirements of NFPA 1006 for Confined Space Rescue Technician and NFPA 1006 Technical Rescuer Level II standards. Upon completion, students will gain the knowledge, skill and ability to preplan confined spaces for rescue, manage rescue operations, the ability to control hazards, learn advanced skill in confined space rescue communications and participate in various scenarios for team building skills.

Participants will have the ability to evaluate, manage, and perform the following skills:

- > Size up
- > Recognition of confined spaces
- > Confined space hazard recognition and mitigation
- > Atmospheric monitoring
- > Non-entry retrieval
- > Entry-type rescue
- > SCBA and SAR
- > Patient packaging
- > Lowering and raising systems

## Dyersburg Police Department Welcomes New Recruits

The Dyersburg Police Dept selected three new recruits in January. Scott Bruce is from Memphis and was previously employed by a private security firm. Jessica Luckenbaugh is from Dyersburg and was employed as a correctional officer in Lauderdale Co. and William Holbrook is a former correctional officer from Howe, Indiana.

Recruits start out with 1 week of classroom instruction and are then assigned to a Field Training Officer for shift assignment work. They will attend the TN Law Enforcement Training Academy in Nashville for a 10 week curriculum. They will receive instruction in such areas as Legal Issues, State Law, Patrol Tactics, Officer Survival, Defensive Tactics, Emergency Driving, Firearms & Range Operations, Ethics, Domestic Abuse, DUI Enforcement, Child Sex Abuse and other Patrol related topics.

As you can imagine, a police officer's training is arduous. We wish you the best in your endeavors.

### **PREVENTING GASOLINE BURN INJURIES**

**GASOLINE: ITS ONLY USE IS TO FUEL AN ENGINE.**

**REMEMBER THAT GASOLINE VAPORS CAN BE IGNITED FROM MANY FEET AWAY, BY ANY SOURCE OF HEAT (SUCH AS SPARKS OR FLAMES).**

**Never use in or near a barbeque grill or to accelerate a fire.**

**Never use as a cleaner or solvent.**

**Never use gasoline indoors.**

**Never siphon gasoline by mouth, as it is harmful or fatal if swallowed.**

**Never induce vomiting if gasoline is swallowed. Instead, seek medical attention.**

**Never fill gasoline tanks that are close to hot engines.**

### **STORING GASOLINE**

**Store gasoline only in an approved container. (ASTM F852 standard).**

**Store gasoline in well ventilated outside storage building that is not attached to your home. Be sure to keep ignition sources away.**

**Never store in glass jars, milk jugs or other non approved containers.**

**Don't store extra gasoline inside the vehicle.**

**Don't store gasoline in other types of fuel containers.**



## GREEN JOBS CURRICULUM COMING TO DSCC

FORWARD MOVING COMMUNITY COLLEGE—DYERSBURG STATE will soon add green jobs training to its curriculum thanks to a Dept. of Labor grant as part of the \$2.9 million Energy Training Partnership Grant under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) Green Jobs Training Program. The \$2.9 million was awarded to Memphis Bioworks, one of 25 recipients across the U.S. DSCC was one of several key recipients to partner with Memphis Bioworks to produce new training programs educating those seeking employment in the emerging “green” economy and in biosciences.

Per Secretary of Labor, Hilda L Solis: “Our outstanding award recipients were selected because their proposed projects will connect workers to career pathways in green industries and occupations through diverse partnerships.”

DSCC President, Dr. Karen Bowyer stated that “DSCC will receive \$153,400 in year 1 and \$158,720 in year 2 as part of this \$2.9 million grant. We will use part of these funds to employ an instructor in agriculture who will help us begin the 2 + 2 program with UT Martin next fall. Our program will focus on agriculture production operations and biomass crop production.”



## City of Dyersburg Severe Weather Preparedness Information

Mayor John Holden and the employees of the City of Dyersburg want to make sure that our community knows what to do in the event of a severe weather emergency. Listed below is important information that may save your life.

1. Go to <http://www.nws.noaa.gov/om/brochures/ttl.pdf>, and download the National Weather Service Severe Weather Preparedness Brochure. This brochure will provide storm terminology and storm safety information.
2. Every home and business needs a severe weather safety plan. The NWS brochure can help you develop your plan.
3. There are no official storm shelters in Dyersburg. This is why it is extremely important for each home and business to develop your own safety plan, using the NWS Brochure available in the link in #1.
4. The City of Dyersburg has 8 tornado sirens. The sirens are activated anytime a tornado warning has been issued for any location in Dyer County. A steady alert tone will sound in 4 minutes intervals, for the duration of the warning. There is no “all clear” signal.
5. Residents of the City of Dyersburg can sign up for **CodeRed**, an automated calling service that sends emergency information to your telephone. If you have “wired” service through AT&T, you are automatically enrolled. Cell phones and VOIP telephones must enroll to get the service. Go to [www.dyersburgtn.gov](http://www.dyersburgtn.gov), and click on the **CodeRed** link to enroll free of charge.
6. If you have a storm shelter, make sure it has been registered with the Dyersburg Fire Department. They will GPS the exact location and record it in a responder data-base.
7. **DO NOT CALL 911 OR 311 FOR INFORMATION** when a tornado warning has been issued. These types of calls tie up valuable resources and delays response to other valid emergencies.
8. **WEATHER RADIO** - every home and business should have a weather radio. We recommend the type that has “SAME” (specific area message encoding) technology, which allows you to program the specific counties you want to hear warnings for. **WEATHER RADIOS SAVES LIVES**
9. For additional information, or assistance with emergency preparedness, please feel free to call the Dyersburg Emergency Operations Center at 731-288-3588, and select option #3.
10. **TAKE SEVERE WEATHER PREPAREDNESS SERIOUS – BE PREPARED.**



## **Dyer County Historical Society Updates Dyer County Museum With Partitioned Exhibits**

Albert Brasfield is installing the partitions that the members of the Dyer County Homebuilders helped design and build. These partitions will help the Dyer County Historical Society create an improved experience with many exhibits and displays in the Dyer County Museum. There will be a total of 12 new partitions installed in strategic locations throughout the museum. These will be painted and new exhibits will be on display. The newest artifact received is the safe from Dyersburg Fabrics which burnt to the ground in 2007; donated several years ago the problem was getting the large safe moved. This is the largest artifact received to date and will be the center piece for the Dyersburg Fabric display.

The exhibits that are planned for the Dyer County Museum include the Dyersburg Fire Department, Dyersburg Fabrics, the Bob Norman Indian Artifacts exhibit and the History of Schools in Dyer County.

The Dyer County Historical Society is a non-profit entity whose purpose is to collect and preserve the history of Dyer County. The members of the Dyer County Homebuilders Association volunteered their time to help the Historical Society make improvements to the Dyer County Museum.

"I am excited about the help that the Dyer County Homebuilders have given us in these improvements to the Dyer County Museum" said Walden, Historical Society President. "Each time we make improvements, it means that we are better able to serve the public."

The Dyer County Historical Society supports the Dyer County Museum which is located at 120b McGaughey Av., east, next door to the YMCA in the old Dyersburg High School building.

The Dyer County Historical Society meets every second Tuesday of the month at 4:30pm at the Professional Development Center. Anyone interested in the Dyer County Historical Society or the Dyer County Museum is encouraged to contact Walden at the Professional Development Center in Dyersburg, the PDC is located at 305 College St.

A small smattering of exhibits can be viewed at the old Readmore Book Store at Dyersburg Mall. "The purpose of this display is to let the public know what the Dyer County Historical Society is doing and to invite them to participate in our efforts" said Walden. "Some of the things that we have on display at the mall are school artifacts, a slide show of old images of Dyer County, a few samples of the Don and Nancy Timmerman Doll House collection and images from Menglewood, TN."
